We then divide the resulting change in individual income tax plus the resulting change in the employer and employee portions of payroll taxes for Social Security and Medicare by that $\$ 1,000$. We then calculate the averages by weighting by the initial value of wages and salaries. For married couples filing jointly, we assign a portion of the $\$ 1,000$ increase to each spouse based on their initial shares of the household's total wages and salaries.
